Texas A&M News and Events

TAMU Galveston Did you know that Texas A&M operates two branch campuses? One is in the Middle East and the other is right here in Texas. Since Texas A&M has a broad system of schools, you might wonder what the difference between being a branch campus and being part of the Texas A&M system of schools is exactly. Being a branch campus means that the institution is under the management and control of the Board of Regents of the Texas A&M University System, with degrees offered under the name and authority of Texas A&M University at College Station. The students pull tickets for games just like College Station students and are afforded all of the same rights and privileges. Diplomas are awarded by Texas A&M College Station.

Texas A&M Galveston is celebrating their 50th year this year! One of the things Sea Aggies (as TAMU Galveston students are called) are known for much like their land-locked counterparts in College Station—are their adherence and loyalty to Aggie traditions. Sea Aggies take part in all of the timehonored Aggie traditions like Big Event, the Aggie Ring, Elephant Walk, Howdy, Muster and the 12th Man, but they also have their own traditions: Maritime Ball, The Anchor (which is kind of like the Sully statue), SALT Camp, Texas Clipper Training vessel. The Sea Aggies just began their own Century Tree tradition – they took a sapling from the Century Tree in College Station and planted it on the senior knoll in Galveston!



Century Tree Andy Duffy, '75, is raising seedlings from the Century Tree on the A&M main campus, and selling them to raise funds for a

President's Endowed Scholarship. Kevin Jordan, '96, purchased a seedling and graciously donated it to Texas A&M at Galveston. The Century Tree, a live oak, is located in the heart of the main campus near the Academic Building. It is believed to be one of the first trees planted on the campus of the state's first public institution of higher learning, which opened in 1876. The tree has been the site of numerous marriage proposals, weddings and tourist snapshots because of its immense size and its unique drooping branches. It's not just Aggies who consider the tree famous. The Century Tree has received "Famous Tree of Texas" designation by the Texas Forest Service. The "Famous Tree of Texas" designation is reserved for "an elite group of trees that have 'witnessed exciting times in Texas frontier history' and are alive today".

Code Maroon A bomb threat prompted a 5-hour evacuation at Texas A&M on October 19th. Texas A&M University's campus was shut down for about five hours after an emailed bomb threat prompted an evacuation of more than 50,000 people and a building-by-building search. The evacuation order, posted on the university's website as a "Code

Maroon" warning, directed those on campus to immediately evacuate by foot and not to use a vehicle. After the evacuation, the campus seemed like a ghost town. People could be seen off-campus, sitting under trees or waiting at the local restaurants. No bomb was found and school resumed as normal on Monday.

For anyone not familiar with Code Maroon, it is Texas A&M University's emergency notification system. Code Maroon uses multiple notification methods in a best effort to reach campus members in an emergency – by SMS text message, Texas A&M Email (Neo), KAMU-FM radio, campus cable television, Emergency Alert System radios, computer alerts, classroom alerts, Twitter and RSS. Bonfire Remembrance November 18th The Texas Aggie Bonfire has always symbolized every Aggie's "burning desire" to beat the University of Texas in football. On November 18th, 1999 at 2:42 a.m., the Texas Aggie Bonfire collapsed. The collapse killed 12 Aggies and injured 27 others. Every November 18th, Aggies gather at the Bonfire Memorial at 2:42 am to pay their respects to the 12 Aggies lost that fateful day. This year's

Elephant Walk /Junior E-Walk Elephant Walk is one of the oldest traditions at Texas A&M, with its rich history dating back to the year 1926. This year marks the 86th anniversary of this event! Elephant Walk marks the end of the usefulness of the Aggie seniors to the student body. Like dying elephants, which wander the jungle looking for a place to die after their value to the herd is over, thousands of seniors will join hands and wander aimlessly about campus visiting landmarks for the symbolic "last time." The event occurs annually prior to the last regularly scheduled football game. Seniors meet at Kyle Field for a yell practice and presentations. Afterwards, senior yell leaders and redpots will lead the group through campus. The seniors will stop at Fish Pond, the Lawrence Sullivan Ross Statue, and the Corps Quadrangle for brief yell practices before heading out to the Bonfire site on the Polo Fields. Elephant Walk 2012 is scheduled for November 20th.

Note that this Aggie tradition is known to underclassmen as "E-Walk" since it is bad for underclassmen to say the word elephant as it is classified as a "senior word." For more information, visit
